Pastoral visitation is available to those who are hospitalized, temporarily laid up at home, or going through rehab at a facility. Because hospitals and other institutions do not notify the church when a patient is admitted, we need for you or your family member to notify us. Pastor David understands that scheduling may depend on frequency of doctor's appointments or the church member's schedule. Visitation is always available, however, as the shut-in member's health and life situation may change and more extensive pastoral care is needed. 

On October 30th 2024 Shelter Inc announced the groundbreaking of a home for children who have survived human trafficking. This home will have 12 rooms for girls ages 12-18 and they are hoping to have it open late summer or early fall.

It was then shared at TPIRC, Spiritual Life and Community Outreach, where we came up with the idea to make fleece tie blankets for the girls coming in. Fabric has been purchased through the Wachs Fund and we are ready to begin! Our first get together is listed below, please join us for this

Saturday, May 17th from 10:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m.

What will be required is to cut the corners using a template already prepared, cut short strips along all sides of the blanket and tie these strips to secure the front panel to the back panel of fabrics.

The cutting and tying may be done while sitting. If you have fabric scissors to cut, please bring yours. Otherwise we will have some scissors available.

There is no need to sign up. Please feel free to bring a friend as well.


