Martin Luther once said something to the effect of, "Imperfect though she be, the church is still our mother." Those maybe were not his exact words, but that was the gist of them. And Luther did in fact use the maternal analogy for the institutional church.

Rally Day will be on Sunday September 7th, and that of course, is our annual come-back-to-church rallying call after so many of our members have been scattered out to the four winds over the summer months. The term "rally" means to come back together after having been dispersed. It means to end the exile. Rally Day is scheduled each year to remind everyone that the fall, winter, and spring programs are starting up again, and that this local expression of the Body of Christ is still here to rise to meet them.

The church is the people, the whole people. Regardless of generation, it is the whole people of God coming together to worship the God who gives us life. The church is the sacred gathering, imperfect though we are. And we gather together not because we're perfect, but because God is. For in our gathering we believe that God comes down to meet us. And in that encounter we are refreshed, we are renewed, and we are regenerated. This meeting together to jointly encounter God is the church's first order of business.

Pastoral visitation is available to those who are hospitalized, temporarily laid up at home, or going through rehab at a facility. Because hospitals and other institutions do not notify the church when a patient is admitted, we need for you or your family member to notify us. We will be more than happy to accommodate your request for pastoral care. Please note also that the pastor may be reached for emergencies at (224) 386-6285 (cell phone).

Pastor David's procedure in visiting St. Paul's shut-ins, as well as, those members who have a difficult time getting to church is to offer support, bring Holy Communion (their option) and to let them know we journey together in worship. Pastor David understands that scheduling may depend on frequency of doctor's appointments or the church member's schedule. Visitation is always available, however, as the shut-in member's health and life situation may change and more extensive pastoral care is needed. Any church member or their family member desiring more frequent pastoral visitation, or to be placed on the visitation list in the first place should contact the church office at (847)-358-0399 to make arrangements.

Understanding Substance Use Disorder & Harm Reduction

A Faithful Response from Our Church Community

Substance use disorder (SUD) is not a moral failure—it is a health condition that often stems from trauma, pain, or unmet needs. It affects people from all walks of life, including individuals and families within our own congregation.

Harm reduction is a compassionate, practical approach to supporting people who use substances. It doesn't require someone to stop using to receive care. Instead, it focuses on reducing harm and building trust—just as Jesus did when he fed the hungry, healed the sick, and met people where they were.

As people of faith, we are called to love, not label. Our Christian tradition reminds us that healing begins with hospitality, not shame. The Church was once the birthplace of recovery support and we can be again.



What You Can Do

- Speak with compassion. Use people-first language (e.g., "a person with a substance use disorder").
- Avoid judgment. Addiction is a health issue, not a moral weakness.
- Offer support. If someone shares their struggle, listen and connect them to help—not condemnation.
- Pray for healing. For those in recovery, those still struggling, and the families affected.
- Let us be a church that reflects God's grace and meets people in their full humanity.

He arranged and paid for an Uber when he realized he wasn't able to drive her home, gave her his phone number in case she needed more help.


Thankfully, she is fine, a bit shaken up but no issues. Definitely made better by the kind, calm, considerate towie!

NEIGHBORS IN NEED

The Neighbors in Need offering supports the UCC's ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries to fund local and national justice initiatives, advocacy efforts and direct service projects. These include resources, news updates and action alerts related to justice issues.

Advocacy efforts include the federal budget, voting rights, immigration, health care, hate crimes, civil liberties and environmental issues. One-third of the



offering supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministries working with several tribes in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin, Nebraska and Minnesota.

Mission Moment

In October 2024, Shelter Inc. announced the groundbreaking on Illinois' first DCFS licensed home for Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children survivors. It is expected to be completed in 2025. The home is intended for female youth survivors; the average age of these girls is 14.



Several months ago, TPIRC along with Community Outreach teamed up to begin a blanket ministry for girls who will be living at the complex. We meet on the third Saturday of each month form 10-12 in fellowship hall. During one of those get togethers, the idea of Hygiene Kits for the girls was born.

Beginning on Rally Day (September 7th) envelopes will be available on the bulletin board (where the coffee sign up is) in fellowship hall and on the bulletin board at the East entrance. We are asking for a donation of \$10 that will cover the cost of one kit. Each kit will contain: Toothbrush, toothpaste, deodorant comb, nail file, nail polish, note pad and pen. We will be purchasing these items in mass.




