Pastor's	Pen	 	

What we think of as the first Thanksgiving in America, took place in Plymouth, Massachusetts, in the autumn of 1621. That is the event that we all learned about when we were children, and it is the event that our current celebration of Thanksgiving is based on. The pilgrims got together with their Native American neighbors and had a three-day feast, at the heart of which was a sense of gratitude to Almighty God for the blessings they had received over the course of the past year.

What made this first Thanksgiving all the more remarkable is the that it came on the heels of significant tragedy. Over the previous winter after *The Mayflower* had dropped anchor, roughly half their number had perished from disease and cold weather. And yet, even after all of that, the pilgrims felt compelled to give thanks. Was that because they were in denial and pretended that their losses were good things? No, not at all. But at the same time, however, they still recognized the providence of God manifested in their indigenous neighbors who had helped them to plant crops and get settled in their new home. And so, they gathered and they gave thanks.

Thanksgiving is possible, even in the midst of pain. Thanksgiving is a rational recognition of the goodness of God, even at times in which it may be hard to feel thankful about much of anything. But then again, that is because Thanksgiving is not about what we "feel;" rather, it is about what we know to be true. It is about thanking God for the external, objective truisms of God's goodness, mercy, and grace to each of us.

The scriptures, in various places, point to a future realm in which God will once and for all do away with death, and mourning, and crying, and pain. One of the better-known passages on this is Revelation 21:1-5, but there are yet others which herald the notion that God isn't finished with making all things new. So, if there is anything that we may hold on to for hope, it is certainly that! Wherever you may find yourself at Thanksgiving this year, all of us at St. Paul pray that God's best would be yours in abundance. We pray that you might find hope when there's tragedy, and that you might find peace when there's strife. And with all of it, we pray that your heart would be connected to the heart of Almighty God, from Whom, all blessings flow.

Pastor David understands that scheduling may depend on frequency of doctor's appointments or the church member's schedule. Visitation is always available, however, as the shut-in member's health and life situation may change and more extensive pastoral care is needed. It was a habit that I kept up over the years even though my Special Needs sons are now both in their thirties and wear sizes larger than me. This year I got them both some new shirts and blue jeans to wear for the Fall and Winter to come. But when it came time to put them in the closets and dressers they just wouldn't fit. There were too many old clothes from past years still in them.

I decided then to do some "Spring" cleaning in Autumn and started to pull out the old shirts and pants that were still in good condition but weren't getting worn anymore. I didn't leave my own closet out either. Soon we had two, large, trash bags full of clothes to donate to the local thrift store and help keep other people warm this Winter. It felt good emptying out the dressers and closets again. It had been too long since I did it last. It made my heart feel light.

I think this feeling came from what I learned when I was a boy. When I was only eleven years old my Nana's old house caught fire and burned down in the middle of the night. We all escaped with our lives but lost every thing we owned. As traumatic as that experience was, though, it taught me a valuable lesson about just how little we need to be happy. I found that all we really need is a little food in our stomachs, a roof over our heads, a few clothes on our backs, Love in our hearts and faith in our souls. The rest doesn't add much.

In fact, I found that having too much stuff can weigh you down and keep you from the happiness you want.


